Since our founding in 1973, Young Audiences New Jersey & Eastern Pennsylvania (YA) has grown into the region's largest and most comprehensive not-for-profit arts education organization serving in each of New Jersey's 21 counties and the 7 easternmost counties of Pennsylvania. Here are some of the ways Young Audiences connects students and teachers with the creative process:

YA ArtsCorps

"I really can't explain why I pick these items to photograph. What I do know is that I want my viewer to wonder with me. I want them to think and question these pictures, like I do." – Kalisha Camacho, Apprentice

YA ArtsCorps is a paid summer apprenticeship program for teens in grades 10, 11 and 12 providing arts-based workforce development. Piloted in summer 2014, the program pairs twelve apprentices with a professional teaching artist in a co-op. Each co-op focuses on an art form such as dance, mural, photography, printmaking, fashion design, or sculpture. Hired apprentices work 30 hours a week for five weeks and are paid a salary. One day each week apprentices participate in workshops that reinforce educational, work, and life skills. This is not a camp nor an arts conservatory program, but a job. The program's goal is summarized in its tagline: **"Hired to Create. Inspired to Succeed."**

Arts EdVenture

"YA Arts EdVenture increased learning because students had the opportunity to see and hear information about New Jersey presented in a new and exciting way and from different individuals." –Teacher, George E. Wilson Elementary School

In 2013-14, we launched a new program, Young Audiences Arts EdVenture, a field-trip to the state capital to celebrate New Jersey's history. Designed to engage students in the rich history and achievements of our state through the arts, the outdoor festival included performances, historical activities, and hands-on art making. By combining history with the arts, the event provided students with the opportunity to interact with historic figures played by first person interpreters and participate in hands-on art making activities. A total of 1,679 students and 312 teachers and chaperones attended the events.

Building Roots in Pennsylvania

"I teach children with Autism from ages 5-8. All of my students were fully engaged in the Jump with Jill program and enjoyed themselves. After the performance, Jill came over to say 'hello' to the children, give high-fives and pose for a picture. This was a special experience for my children and made the performance even more meaningful to them. Thank you all for going the extra mile for ALL children!"

Since 2012, YA has been providing arts programming to schools in Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lehigh, Montgomery, and Philadelphia counties in Eastern Pennsylvania. Thanks to funders including The Pennsylvania Council on the Arts, The Connelly Foundation, Target, and NRG Energy, Inc, YA provides residencies, performances, and family arts festivals throughout the region. Over 100,000 students have experienced Jump with Jill, a rock and roll concert teaching students about nutrition. Through a new partnership with Congreso de Latino Unidos, we are bringing YA programming into after school programs throughout Philadelphia.

Sandy Relief Initiative

"Before we worked together I did not want to talk about Hurricane Sandy. It was too difficult. I got upset. You let me draw about my experiences. This was the first time I let myself think about what happened. Making my comic allowed me to express my feelings and experiences about the storm." — Fourth Grader, Monmouth Beach School

In the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, YA launched the Sandy Relief Initiative, harnessing the power of the arts in healing and recovery to offer grants of up to \$10,000 to affected schools in the 2013-14 school year. With a grant from the New Jersey Recovery Fund and donations from supporters, YA partnered with twelve schools, providing arts experiences designed to help students comprehend loss, process memories, and envision the future. The Initiative provided in-depth residencies, performances, and professional development to 4,145 students and 252 teachers. Students participated in a variety of art mediums including percussion, kite making, poetry, graphic novels, instrument making, song writing, dance, script writing, and batik.

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TARGET ARTS EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS: Schools are awarded grants to provide YA arts education programs through an application process that identifies both a school's financial need and its commitment to arts education for their students. Launched in 2010, Target has donated over \$250,000 to serve 34 schools, 13,800 students and 880 teachers.

BUILD A BETTER CHILD CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The Blueprint

Unlike most capital campaigns that are designed to produce strong, enduring structures, we seek to lay a foundation of creativity, innovation and compassion within every child. We currently reach one-third of the region's 1.3 million children — we won't stop until every child experiences quality arts programming every year. Our goal is to raise \$3.1 million.

The Investor's Role

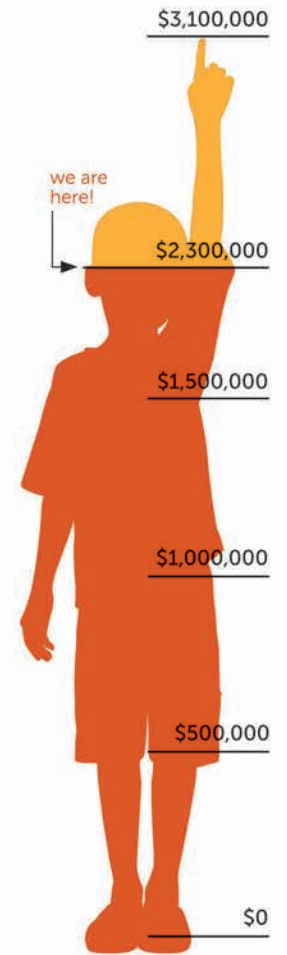
Donors to the Capital Campaign share our vision for a healthy financial future and an increase in programs for underserved students and schools, as follows:

1. ENDOWMENT FUND

Thanks to our long-time advocate and contributor, Betty Wold Johnson, The Robert Wood Johnson 1962 Charitable Trust pledged a \$1 million challenge grant to establish an endowment fund that will ensure continued financial stability and provide resources to develop new and innovative programs. Every gift has been matched 1:1 by the Trust. The Princeton Area Community Foundation has been selected to manage the fund.

2. SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Investment in this fund subsidizes programs for underserved schools and communities with a goal of reaching all children, no matter their geographic location or economic status. Once the goal is reached, a minimum of 10 percent of the Scholarship Fund will be used each year to increase program offerings to schools in need.

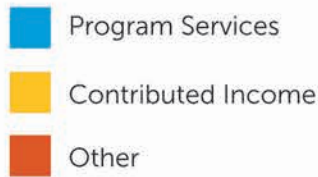
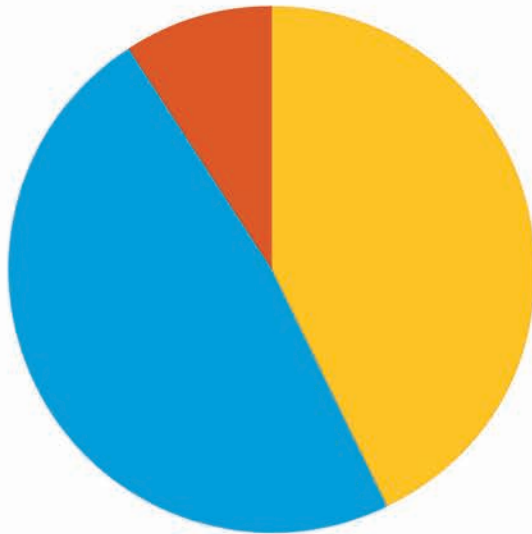
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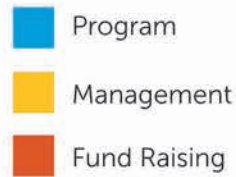
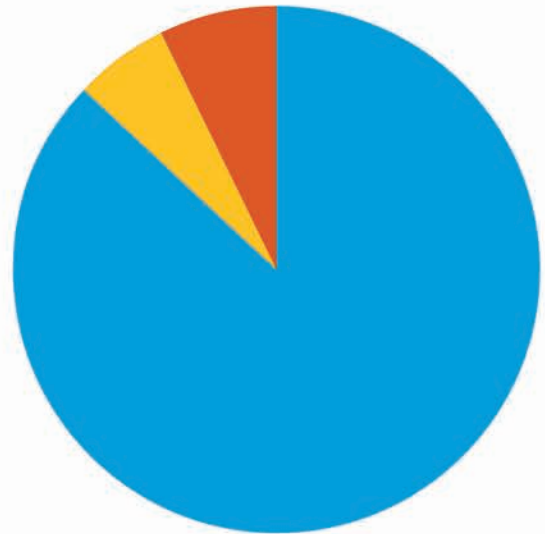
Operating Budget

FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2014

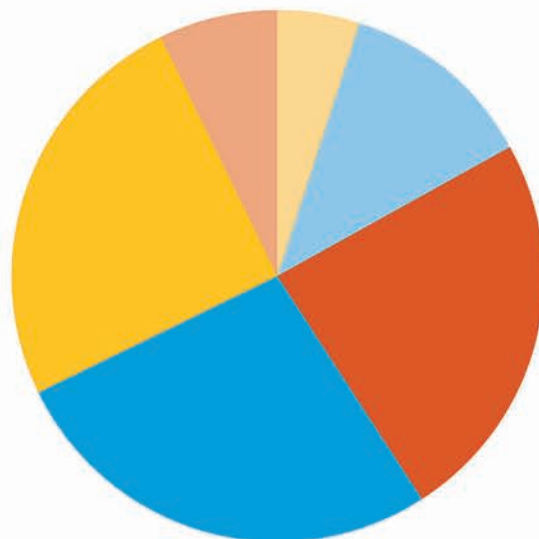
INCOME - \$2,890,346
